Deconstructing Ageism:

Intergenerational Encounters and Multifaceted Narratives of Ageing

Intergenerational relationships are a promising research area to challenge ageism and encourage more realistic and positive representations of ageing and later life. Intergenerational exchanges can deconstruct the dominant cultural narratives of ageing, create more inclusive meanings of old age, and advance cultural change around ageing. Dialogues between different generations can also advance age-friendly policies and practices that recognise and value the needs and contributions of older adults. Additionally, social connections across generations reduce feelings of loneliness and social isolation, which negatively impact physical and mental health. At the same time, intergenerational dialogue plays a crucial role for the ethical and political implications for solidarity, social policy and justice, as well as the creation of a more equitable and inclusive society for all ages. Similarly, intergenerational educational programmes, life-long learning, and the use of narrative and storytelling stimulate empathy and create enhanced awareness of the importance of family relationships, care and community engagement. This special issue aims to bring to light the dynamics of intergenerational relationships by examining the multifaceted narratives of ageing and old age from a variety of disciplines ranging from social sciences and anthropology to cultural studies and the humanities. Possible themes may include, but are not limited to:

- Intergenerational relationships in literary, cultural and audio-visual expressions.
- New constructions of (grand)parenthood and care.
- Double standards of ageing in intergenerational (intimate) relationships.
- Deconstructing ageism and gender inequality in narratives of intergenerational care.
- Collaborative learning in education, creativity, wisdom, and knowledge exchange.
- Intergenerational relationships in physical and emotional well-being.

- Intergenerational dialogue for solidarity, social policy and justice.
